Cosby to headline Capitol festival

Get your knitted sweaters and Jell-O pudding pops ready. One of America's favourite

comedians and TV fathers will headline the opening festival at the Chatham Capitol Theatre.

Bill Cosby is slated to perform two shows o n Sept. 22.

Theatre general manager Dan Donaldson said the legendary per-former is



exactly what's needed to create the buzz.

"It's thrilling," he said. "He's a charming guy and very easy to work with.

"We wanted someone of that calibre to launch the building."

Donaldson said he's worked with the comedian in the past on a number of occasions.

He said Cosby keeps his shows different and gears them to the age of the crowd.



An official announcement was planned at the Capitol Theatre this morning.

"You should not be surprised when you see names of a similar calibre in the regular part of the inaugural season," Donaldson said.

The opening festival will run Sept. 17-25 and also feature impressionist Andre-Philippe Gagnon, Phantom of the Opera's Colm Wilkinson, a production of the ballet Cinderella, and the Dark Nights Movie Company.

The objective is to have a different kind of event each night," Donaldson said. "We wanted to develop something

The third-annual Mayor's Gala for the Arts will take place on the first night on the theatre

A Chatham-Kent celebration is planned for the last day, fea-turing the Windsor Symphony Orchestra, Nathaniel Dett Choral and the Capitol Celebration Choir.

This choir will consist of community members and anyone interested in singing can contact the theatre associa-

Individual tickets for Cosby range from \$60 to \$75. Festival passes will be available — for \$342 or \$262 — each offering various discounts.

Donaldson said a major country music artist will be announced once details are finalized.

Performances before the festival are also planned, with international dance troupe

Tap Dogs taking to the stage Aug. 3-7. Tickets are \$25 to \$35. People who buy a ticket to

any festival event before May 1 can purchase the same number for Tap Dogs at half price.
In light of the years it has

taken to get to this point, Donaldson is happy he can now focus on the entertainment aspect.

"It's been a long time coming," he said. "It's given everybody a different kind of energy and reinvigorated us
